THE FIRST OLYMPIC WALK

A surprising amount has been written about the racewalks at the 1908 Olympics. This is perhaps not surprising, as this was the first Olympics that had included walking events, with a 3500m track walk held on Thursday 14^{th} July (as 3 heats and a final) and a 10 Miles track walk held on 16-17 July (with 2 heats on the 16^{th} and the final on 17^{th}). Here is how that first Olympic walk, over 3500m, panned out.

Heat 1 saw an easy win to English walker George Larner who led from start to finish, with New Zealander Harry Kerr (representing Australasia) next to finish, thirty seconds in arrears.

Heat 2 saw Larner's English teammate Ernie Webb also winning easily, by nearly 2 minutes.

As in the other two heats, the winner led from the start but, unlike the other heats, Canadian George Goulding was hard pressed by English walker Ralph Harrison. Goulding finished strongly to fend off Harrison, winning by 10 seconds.

In the final, Webb, Goulding, and Harrison were the early leaders but they were soon caught by Larner. Soon after this, Harrison was disqualified and, by the end of the first mile, the top four spots had sorted themselves into the final positions. Larner had passed the field, bumping Webb to second place, while Kerr had managed to overtake Goulding for bronze.

These were but 5 of the 25 walkers who contested the 3 heats (2 from Australasia, 1 from Canada, 2 from Denmark, 2 from Germany, 11 from Great Britain, 1 from Hungary, 5 from Netherlands and 1 from Sweden.)

I was excited to receive in November 2018 an article on English walker Sydney Sarel, who finished fifth in heat 1, thus failing to progress to the final. I am indebted to NUTS statistician Bob Phillips for the article which tells us of a life well lived. Alas, I have not been able to find a photo so you will have to paint your own picture of this multi faceted man.
